

Trust in Police, Victim Blame Attitudes, and Lived Experience with Violence as Predictors of Perceptions of Clare's Law in a Canadian Sample

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Background

Domestic Violence (DV)
Disclosure Framework (Clare's
Law): legislation that allows
people in intimate
relationships to request
information from the police
about their partner's history of
domestic violence and risk for
future violence.

- Limited research on its efficacy/public perceptions
- Concerns about unintended consequences (e.g., barriers, victim-blaming)

Research Questions

- 1. What factors influence the likelihood of using Clare's Law?
 - a. Trust in Police?
 - b. Support for victim blame attitudes?
 - c. DV myth acceptance?
 - d. Lived experience with domestic violence?
- 2. What factors do the public foresee as barriers to using Clare's law?

Method

Mixed Methods

- MTurk survey of Canadian perspectives of Clare's Law, N = 184
- Victim Blame Scale IPV (Martin-Fernandez et al., 2018)
- Domestic Violence Myth Acceptance Scale (Peters, 2008)
- Trust in Police Scale (Giacomantonio et al., 2019)
- IPV victimization survey (Cotter et al., 2021)

Quantitative Results

17.4% of participants had heard about Clare's Law before participating; majority of which were from Ontario, Alberta, and British Columbia


	Willingness to use Clare's Law	Belief that Clare's Law can reduce DV
DV myth acceptance	√	X
Lived experience with DV	✓	X
Trust in police	X	✓
Support for victim blame attitudes	X	X

Logistical regression analyses were used for the quantitative results above



Qualitative Results

What are barriers to using Clare's Law?



Those who said they would not use Clare's Law if they experienced DV were asked, why not?

- Cannot imagine themselves as victims of DV (21.88%)
- Distrust in police (15.63%)
- Don't care about partner's past (12.5%)
- Effectiveness and limitations of Clare's Law (28.16%)
- It is a privacy violation (6.25%)
